Our contemporary macrosystem is replete with challenges. Some (like COVID) are newly emerging; others (like racism and environmental injustice) are long-standing, but increasingly visible to greater swaths of humankind. The SSHD 2021-22 Conference Series is designed to support scholarship that advances conceptualizations of macrosystem challenges, methodologies for studying them, and strategies for reducing or navigating them.
